Brother Knights,

A new fraternal year has begun. Many new Grand Knights have taken over control of their councils. Plans for new activities are under way. A real season of excitement. We are also now in full swing with the new initiative, Building the Domestic Church while Strengthening our Parishes. You should have heard about this through the district meetings that were held all over the state. Those items should then be taken back to the council for implementation. The Knights of Columbus is the strong right arm of the church and your council should be the strong right arm of your local priest.

Better yet, have a small group of officers take him out for dinner to have an open discussion about what he would like to see the council doing. This will lead to finding ways he can help the council achieve its goal of Building the Domestic Church and conducting council activities at the parish. Hopefully it will foster a true relationship between the council and the parish priest. Once that is accomplished, you may find it's easier to get permission to hold a church drive or other activity at the church you may not have been able to do in the past. In many meetings I was at this summer there were councils who expressed the lack of cooperation from the parish priest. In nearly every case, the councils had not initiated a meeting with their priest to find out what he wanted. What things he would like to see the council do and how they could help him and the parish.

Your goal should be to become that group that the parish priest thinks of whenever he has a need at the parish. Brothers, I thank you for all you do for your families, parish, priests and communities. The Knight Today, September 2016, Page 2

Building the Domestic Church and the New Evangelization

My dear brother Knights. As we start a new fraternal year we will hear the phrase "Building the Domestic Church" both at the State and at the Supreme level. This initiative from the Supreme Council should not be seen as something new or innovative to our Order.

Looking back to 1882, when the Knights of Columbus were born at the basement of St. Mary's Church in New Haven, CT, we see that Father McGivney turned to the men seen as leaders of the parish and the Irish Catholic community. He saw a problem in the families and turn to good Catholic committed men to solve this problem. The families were struggling and the Knights of Columbus were founded to protect them.

The Dogmatic Constitution of the Church established after the Second Vatican Council: "The family, is so to speak, the domestic church." (Lumen Gentium #11). Based on this definition, the Knights of Columbus were founded to protect and preserve what 82 years later would be called the Domestic Church.

On the New Evangelization, Saint John Paul II called to "re-propose the Gospel to those who have experienced a crisis of faith." If you look around our society we can see a deep crisis of faith, a redefinition of our most basic institutions and principles such as the right to life, the religious freedom, and the identity of the family and the individual. We are also flooded by what Pope Francis calls "the globalization of indifference."

So once again, we see the families struggling in looking for answers for their crisis of faith and identity. Once again, the Knights of Columbus will stand up to protect and preserve our families, the Domestic Churches that make up the foundations and pillars of our parishes, towns, cities, states, and countries. It is us, the men who are seen as leaders of the parishes and the Catholic communities who need to repropose the faith to families that look for a true hope for a better future and the restoration of our moral values and principles. That is what "Building the Domestic Church" is about. As the strong right arm of the Church, we need to flex the muscles of charity, unity, fraternity, and patriotism that have made us the greatest—assume our role as a bold Catholic men.

EDITOR & STATE TREASURER'S **REMARKS**

I would like to share with you some of the funding that your Iowa State Council has provided over the past fiscal year. We can be truly proud of numbers below and your efforts in fund raising really does make a difference.

The Campaign for People with Intellectual Disabilities Fund reached a new record total of \$674,926.13 that was collected by our councils this past year. Your councils donated \$57,962.77 to Special Olympics and \$508,675.52 to other CPID Charities. The Iowa State Council was able to provide \$29,050 to Special Olympics Iowa and \$49,000 to other charities from the state's 10% of the funds collected.

Our Catholic Education Fund provided \$33,000 (or \$8,250 each) to our four Catholic Student Centers. The Pennies for Heaven and Vocation Fund provided \$22,661.04 in funding for vocations in our four dioceses.

The Perpetual Memorial Society Fund provided our bishops with \$11,200.00 for their vocation needs in addition to the \$29,551.98 received from the Christopher Fund interest that was earned the past year.

In addition to the above funding, we have provided another \$8,325.00 for various requests received from our General Fund. If you add up all of the above donations it totals \$749,426.31 and is a record high for the state of Iowa and doesn't include the Foundation donations.

The Football Frenzy Sweepstakes program provided \$14,000 for our General Fund this past year and proves to a big help in our budgeting process and allows for making donations. Be sure you obtain your coupons and become a part of adding funds to our coffers so we can continue to make donations when requested.

With the change made at the last convention for the Perpetual Memorial Society which permits all donations less expenses go to our bishops on an annual basis for their vocations, I would urge all councils and assemblies to enroll their deceased members. That is the least we can do to support our departed brothers while supporting vocations in our dioceses.



Bishops release "Faithful Citizenship for Iowa Catholics" statement

The Iowa bishops have released their "Faithful Citizenship for Iowa Catholics" statement for the 2016 general election. The Catholic Church does not endorse or oppose candidates or political parties. However, it contributes to the political process by encouraging Catholics to take action in the political arena with a properly formed conscience.

"The defense of human life and dignity must begin with the fundamental right to life from natural conception to natural death. From there it extends to fair access to productive work and fair wages, food and shelter, education and health care, protection from harm and freedom to emigrate," the bishops wrote. "All people have a right to these, and therefore we have a duty to help protect life and to provide for the common good."

While most attention is being paid to the presidential race, laws passed by the state legislature probably have a bigger day-to-day effect on most Iowans. That's why the bishops have included a set of questions that could be asked of each candidate. Together we can have a big impact on candidates if we let them know about our priorities.

Having a Council website on IowaKofC.org is the greatest thing since sliced bread. Well, maybe that's an exaggeration, but it may not be far off. Until January of 2015, Ihad only occasionally visited IowaKofC.org, but that changed when the webhost for our Council's old website indicated in the fall of 2014 that they would be ending their

webhosting service. As Council 4208 webmaster, when I first got the news that we were going to have to get a new website, I gave a frustrated sigh and decided to procrastinate and MAYBE look into the situation in 2015. Well, 2015 came, and I knew that the old website was going to die at the end of February 2015, so I decided to check out IowaKofC.org, which I knew had the capability of hosting personal and Council Profile Pages (websites) for FREE. So, I went to IowaKofC. org in January of 2015 and started to play with it, and the more I played, the more I realized how good, wonderful, and powerful IowaKofC.org was, and more and more I began to wish I had moved our website to IowaKofC.org years earlier—especially since the old web host was somewhat clunky for a variety of reasons.

Our Council profile is at http://www.iowakofc.org/profile/DecorahKnights, and all you have to do is go to that web address and you're on our Council website, but there's an even easier way for members to access our site. Long story short, there's a service on the web (freenom.com) that allows one to convert a long, somewhat cumbersome web address to a shorter one, and I used that service to create DecorahKnights.tk. [Sometimes we joke that the "tk" means "The Knights", but that's not really true.] All a member has to do is type in DecorahKnights.tk in the url bar, and he gets to the Council Profile Page (website), and then all he has to do is scroll up and down to see ALL of the Council information mentioned above. It's that easy.

There are many reasons why every Council should have a profile (aka website) on the IowaKofC.org. Younger folks communicate via the web; they expect a web presence. Without it, a Knights of Columbus Council really looks old fashioned. It's also important for all members to be able to know what activities are coming up for the Council, and that's easily done via IowaKofC.org. And this is all FREE! [Well, not really free, but included in our membership dues, but there's no extra expense to the Council.] It's also cool that everything the Council posts to the IowaKofC.org website instantly becomes known to other members and Councils across the State and to the State Knights of Columbus leadership and publicity people, so when your Council does something great and you put it up on the website, it becomes known to a wide audience right away.

Although it's not necessary, it's a very good idea for every member of the Iowa Knights of Columbus to sign up for an account on the IowaKofC.org website. This is easily done by clicking on the "Sign Up for access to the IowaKofC web site" link at the top of the IowaKofC.org website. Being signed up on the website allows a member to get emails when new things are posted on the site, and much, much more, including expanded networking opportunities and access to private areas (called Groups). And when you Sign Up and become a "friend" of your Council, you'll be instantly connected with other Knights members who are friends of the Council. Again, it's not absolutely necessary that a member Sign Up, but it's a bonus for the member and for the Council and other Knights across Iowa.
